Interested or Committed?

Everyone wants good grades for any number of reasons - pride, aspirations of going to college, to stay eligible, or to keep people off their backs.

Whatever the reason, at some point you have to ask yourself:

"Am I interested in getting good grades?"

OR

"Am I committed to getting good grades?"

Being interested is the easy part. Being committed means you have to be willing to put in the time and energy to EARN the good grades. So... which is it?

All students enrolled at Hartnell University need to place their initials next to the following 10 ways in which they'll be committed this school year. Additionally, all students need to place their signature at the end of the Student Pledge.

coming to class EVERY day.

I can't teach you if you aren't here!

2. ... coming to class ON TIME.

I have two class rules: (1) Be on time; (2) Don't be a jerk. These can double as valuable life lessons. As for the first, when the tardy bell rings, I ask that you be in the classroom. If I'm out in the hallway, which I usually am, making eye contact with me as you meander my way does NOT excuse you from being late (even if you give me a high-five). Unexcused tardies are recorded in PowerSchool. The first tardy is a warning. The second one is a warning (and a wag of the finger!). Tardy #3 and beyond are detentions. (I hate doing paperwork, so let's not have to go there.) Your tardies reset at the semester. When you get to class, don't wander around. I appreciate you checking to see if your friend is present, but please find your seat! Sit back and enjoy "This Day in History" and the "Song of the Day"!

3. ... using hall passes sparingly.

If you arrive before the bell rings and need to use the bathroom or run to your locker, please let me know. Don't come to class, talk for a couple of minutes, and ask as the tardy bell rings. The likelihood of me saying "YES" is better the earlier you arrive. You STILL need to take the hall pass. If you leave and come back after the bell rings but didn't take the pass... busted! You will be marked tardy.

4. ... staying off my phone.

Once you enter my classroom and before the bell rings, you are permitted to be on your phone. However, once you enter, your earbuds should be removed. (I mean, how will you hear the "Song of the Day"?!) When the bell rings, phones need to be put away and NOT left on desks, laps, etc. This is when the bell RINGS. I'm generally fairly patient with this, BUT don't test me. Push-come-to-shove, I'll happily take your phone to the Front Office where you can pick it up at the end of the day. Refusing to hand over your phone is a poor choice and (say it with me now) a detention! Phones are NOT to be charged in my class-room. 5. ... staying in my seat.


10. ... asking for help!
